



Education is the premise of progress in every society and plays a vital role in the development of any nation or society. In a large country like India there is a need for both quantity (increased access) and quality (relevance and excellence of academic programmes offered) in education. Towards establishing quality in higher education, the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) has been set up that facilitates self assessment by Higher Education Institutions and validation of the 'Quality Status' of the institution.

The College underwent the 3rd cycle of Assessment and Accreditation by NAAC in 2019 and was awarded an A grade with a CGPA of 3.09.

The process of assessment and accreditation under the revised methodology and measurement system is both quantitative and qualitative. The process commenced with the submission on 6/3/19 of the Self Study Report (SSR) that forms the backbone of the entire process. The College SSR was a massive self evaluation document (file size 17.3 GB) along with proofs of claims made by the institution.

This was followed by the month long Data Validation and Verification process that is a computer assisted system of validation of quantitative data and claims made in the SSR.

Simultaneously the Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS) was administered online by NAAC to a random sample of 20-30% of students to include them in the process of quality assessment. The final step of the process was the Peer Team visit of distinguished academicians to the College for an onsite visit and validation. On 9th and 10th of August 2019, a three member Peer Team comprising of the following members visited our College:

- Prof. Dr. Bijaya Kumar Sahu (Vice Chancellor, Incharge, University of Orissa) - Chairperson
- Prof. (Dr.) M. Vimala Naidu (Former Chairperson, Deparment of Hindi, Bangalore University) - NAAC Coordinator
- Prin. (Dr.) Santosh Patkar (University of Goa) Member




Handover of Assessment Report by Peer Team





A Travel Memoir by Prof. Kamala Arunachalam Dean

Travel is truly an education, a real-life education. To travel is to discover. When you travel you learn so much, it opens your mind and heart. It broadens your horizon, expands your outlook, and exposes you to a different culture. The best part of travelling is not the destination but the memories you gather along the way.

A few months back we travelled from Chennai to the historical temple of the city Madurai. The long travel with friends facilitated a stimulating conversation ranging from British rule to current politics.

We halted in a village called Surulipatti. As we entered a homely restaurant, a freshly garlanded framed photo of a foreigner caught my eyes. Upon enquiring, the hotel owner Pandiraj was only too happy to share with me the mystery behind it. As he unfolded the story, it turned out to be a marvelous piece of history associated with not only this village but many villages around. Apparently, this photo frame adorns the walls of many houses across the villages, even the PWD office at Madurai.

The perennial river of Kerala is the Periyar, which has a very high discharge capacity flowing westward. It is the main source of water for the southern parts of Kerala. The British had observed that much of the water was wasted off as it joined the Arabian Sea. They came up with the idea of changing its direction to flow eastward so as to meet the water needs of villages in and around Madurai, which incidentally was a rain shadow region.

The then maharaja of Tiruvanathapuram, Swati Tirunal consented to construct the Mullaperiyar dam at the site of confluence of Periyar with its tributary Mullaiyar. The project began in 1884 with the deployment of Madras battalion and the locals. It so happened that the coffer dams that restrained the river waters were regularly swept away by floods of rain. The bridge there had collapsed three times. Due to these failures the British had stopped funding the project.

A British officer named Penny Quick was in charge, who understood the dire need for this project to succeed as it would serve to quench the acute water shortage in the region where agriculture is the only source of living. He resigned his job, pledged all his property including his wife's jewelry, and began the work determinedly with the local people in 1987. "I realized that there were good pious people too in the British Raj like Penny Quick. People like him, who with all their heart devoted their life to the cause of the local people. Goodness and kindness emanate from good humans irrespective of their caste and nationalism"

The dam created a reservoir in the remote gorge of the Periyar river situated around 3000 ft. above the sea level, in a dense and malarial jungle from which water flowed into Madurai's Vaigai river.

It is considered to be a most extraordinary feat of engineering ever performed by a man. A large amount of manual labor was involved. Around 83 people died of disease during the construction of the dam and were buried on site. Thus, this dam was not built by stone and bricks but by tears and blood. The project was completed, and to the great joy of the people, the gushing water flowed with full force inward into the region. The happiness of the people brought joyful tears in the eyes of Penny Quick and his wife. The benefit of irrigation continues to this day, all because of the selfless efforts of Penny Quick. People remember him to this day and pay homage to him by offering Pongal at his burial site during Makhar Sankranti, the state festival of Tamil Nadu.

Pandiraj concluded his narration and there was complete silence, as a quiet gesture of respect to the brave unsung heroes, along with Penny Quick.

Later we visited Kodaikkanal, a beautiful hill station and a haven for nature lovers. As I sat in the green valley point view from Pillar rocks in the quiet calm of the evening, I experienced an extraordinary sensation. The wind caressing my face, the setting sun bathing me with its mild warmth and the joyous tweaking and twittering of the homing birds transported me to another world. Engulfed in the power of nature, it was a moment of pure joy of self expansion.

An enlightening revelation dawned on me. Till now, I was full of stories of exploitations lashed out by the British on Indians, the massacre at the Jallianwalla Bagh by General Dyer and other such incidences, painting the British rulers as tyrants, but my prejudice took a blow. I realized that there were good pious people too in the British Raj like Penny Quick. People like him, who with all their heart devoted their life to the cause of the local people. Goodness and kindness emanate from good humans irrespective of their caste and nationalism.

This was a new insight, a shift of my own rigid paradigm, another lesson for life.

<u>मूल्यशिक्षण – आजच्या काळाची गरज</u> -कोमल वाटेगावकर

शिक्षण हे सर्वतोपरी संपूर्ण तेव्हा मानले जाते जेव्हा ते एखाद्या व्यक्तीच्या शारीरिक आणि मानसिक विकासाला कारणीभूत ठरते. एक शिक्षक म्हणून जेव्हा मी याकडे पाहते त्यावेळी मला आजच्या शिक्षणसंस्थेत अनेक त्रुटी दिसतात. माझ्यामते मानसिक विकासाचा महत्वपूर्ण घटक म्हणजे नैतिकतेचे शिक्षण ज्याचा अभाव. आजच्या पिढीतील तरुणांमध्ये आढळून येतो आजचा तरुण हा आजच्या जगाला विकसित करू शकणारा एकमेव सक्षम घटक आहे आणि त्याच्यावर सामाजिक उत्थानाची जवाबदारी आहे. अशावेळेला शिक्षणासंबंधी कोणतीही धोरणे ही पुढील अनेक पिढ्या घडविण्यास किंवा बिघडवण्यास कारणीभूत ठरू शकतात. द्दैवाने आज उच्च शिक्षणातील व्यावसायिक शिक्षणाबद्दलच्या धोरणात सरकारने कोणतेही दीर्घकालीन धोरण न ठरवल्याने न्यायालयेच दरवर्षी ही धोरणे ठरवतात. सामाजिक विचारांमध्ये क्रांती घडवून आणायची असल्यास नैतिकतेचे शिक्षण मुलांना त्यांच्या वाढत्या वयातच देणे ही आजच्या काळाची गरज ठरली आहे. खरं म्हणजे मानसिकशास्त्रानुसार बरोबर काय आणि चूक काय हे प्रत्येक व्यक्ती व परिस्थितीनुसार बदलत असते. परंतु जेव्हा आपण समाजाला घडवतो तेव्हा असा वैयक्तिक दृष्टिकोन ठेवून चालणार नाही. आजच्या तरुणवर्गावर प्रत्यक्ष वा अप्रत्यक्षरित्या प्रभाव पाडणारे अनेक घटक या आजच्या संगणकयुगात उपलब्ध आहेत. सोशल मीडिया हा त्यातीलच एक घटक. त्याच्या आहारी न जाऊन कुठेतरी खरंखुरं जगायला शिकवण खुप गरजेचं झालं आहे डीपी , स्टेटस , सेल्फी ,ट्विट , OMG , ROFL हे शब्द काही वर्षांपूर्वी आपल्या शब्दकोशातही नव्हते. "आपल्या व्यक्तिगत आयुष्यातील गोष्टी कोणाला सांगायच्या नसतात", या शिकवणीतून मोठी झालेली आमची पिढीसुद्धा जेव्हा आजच्या पिढीला "आज कोणती भाजी बनवली " किंवा "आज कुठे भटकतोय " हे सोशल मीडियाच्या माध्यमातून सगळ्या जगाला ओरडून सांगताना बघते तेव्हा काहीस हास्यास्पद वाटतं. यावर काही लोकांचे असे म्हणणे आहे कि इंटरनेट मुळे संवाद सोप्पा झालाय. पण दिवसातले काही तास, अनेकदा दिवसाचे दिवस आपण कोणालाही प्रत्यक्ष न भेटता होणार संवाद हा खराखुरा संवाद नव्हे असे माझे प्रांजळ मत आहे. सतत सोशल मीडिया वर राहणारी माणसे दिवसेंदिवस जास्तीतजास्त एकटी होत जातात. माझे किती मित्र आहेत याबाबतची कायम असलेली प्रतिस्पर्धा, सेल्फी घेताना गेलेला लोकांचा जीव , सोशल मीडिया मुळे फसले जाणे , मेसेजचा चुकीचा अर्थ लावून घेतल्यामुळे झालेली भांडणे, इंटरनेट वर उपलब्ध असलेली माहिती सर्रासपणे वापरणारी आणि स्वतःचे वेगळे विचार मांडायला विसरलेल्या आजच्या पिढीला बघून मन कधी कधी व्यथित होतं. परंतु या सगळ्यात आजकालच्या पिढीला चुकीचे ठरवणे हा उद्देश नसून या साधनांच्या आहारी गेल्यामूळे त्यांना लागलेलं व्यसन आणि त्याचा होणार वाईट परिणाम एक शिक्षक म्हणून मला व्ययित करतो.

या सर्व गोष्टींचा सारासार विचार केला तर मूल्यशिक्षण ही काळाची गरज आहे असे वाटते आणि याचे मुख्य कारण म्हणजे आजच्या सतत बदलाला सामोरे जाणाऱ्या जगात अनेक धर्म ,पंथ असलेल्या आपल्या देशात सांस्कृतिकदृष्ट्या संघर्ष होणे साहजिकच आहे. या भिन्नतेतीलही समेट शोधण्यासाठी मूल्यशिक्षण नक्कीच मदत करेल. याशिवाय सामाजिक व सांस्कृतिक बदल करणारे अनेक घटक उदाहरणार्थ संयुक्त कुटुंबपद्धतीपासून विभक्त कुटुंबपद्धतीकडे , बाहेरील जगातील जीवघेणी स्पर्धा , आई वडिलांच्या अपेक्षांचे ओझे , शिक्षणाचे व्यावसायिकीकरण , मीडियाचा प्रचंड पगडा , माहिती तंत्रज्ञानाचा चुकीचा वापर , जागतिकीकरण इत्यादी गोष्टींचे आजच्या पिढीवर आलेले

प्रचंड दडपण या मूल्यांचा विपर्यास करण्यास कारणीभूत आहेत. त्यामूळे याला सामोरे जाण्यासाठी तरुणाईला सञ्ज करायला हवे. या सर्व मूल्यांच्या जीर्णोद्धाराचा लढा सतत आपल्या बुद्धी आणि मनात चालू ठेवणे महत्वाचे आहे. हे साधण्याचा सोप्पा उपाय म्हणजे या मूल्यांचे बाळकडू लहानपणीच देणे. अर्थात हे सर्व अचानक साध्य होणार नाही. त्याला वेळ लागेल. आपण जर या पिढीला संवेदनशील बनवले तर सत्ता आणि सामर्थ्य याच्या मागे सतत धावणे ही कल्पनाच किती फुटकळ आहे हे त्यांच्या आपोआपच लक्षात येईल आणि म्हणूनच हे शिक्षण फक्त पुस्तकांपुरते मर्यादित न ठेवता, अनुभवात्मक शिक्षणावर भर देणे महत्वाचे आहे. या शिक्षणाच्या अभ्यासक्रमाची रचना करण्याकरिता अनेक बुद्धीजीवी लोकांनी एकत्र येऊन विचारमंथन करायला हवे. या अभ्यासक्रमामध्ये विविधतेतील एकता, सहनशीलता , संवेदनशीलता , एकमेकांबद्दलची आदर , अनेकतत्ववाद , वैज्ञानिक दृष्टिकोन , श्रमप्रतिष्ठा , सौजन्यशीलता , राष्ट्रभक्ती इत्यादी विषयांचा सामावेश करावा. याचा आराखडा तयार करताना समुदायाच्या सामाजिक सामंजस्याचेही भान ठेवायला हवे. यात अनुभवात्मक शिक्षणावर जास्त भर द्यावा. यात कोठेही धर्म, जात, पंथ याविषयीचा उल्लेख येऊ नये.आपल्या आजूबाजूला घडणाऱ्या गोष्टींचा आपल्या वागण्याबोलण्यावर ,आपल्या समाजाविषयीच्या दृष्टिकोनावर , विश्वासप्रणालीवर ,मूल्यप्रणालीवर, वैयक्तिक नैतिक प्रणालीवर परिणाम होत असतो याचेही भान ठेवावे. आपल्याला जर मूल्यांच्या माध्यमातून भारताला पुन्हा बांधायचे असेल तर भारतीयांमध्ये चांगल्या मूल्यांचे पुनर्संचयन करायला हवे. भौतिकवादाचा शाप , सामर्थ्य व संपत्तीचे आकर्षण या घटकांपासून समाजाचे संरक्षण केले पाहिजे. मूल्यशिक्षण ही प्रचलित शिक्षणातील एक अत्यंत महत्वाची उणीव आहे शिक्षणातून ज्ञान प्राप्त होते, कौशल्ये विकसित होतात अर्थात तेही मर्यादित प्रमाणात ! शिक्षणात संस्कार, संद्रण , संदप्रवृत्ती , संदाचार यांच्या विकासाला काही महत्त्व राहिलेले नाही ही वस्तुस्थिती असली तरी त्याचे दष्परिणाम आपण भोगत आहोत. ते म्हणजे समाजाचे नैतिक अधःपतन , सर्व क्षेत्रांतील भ्रष्टाचार व दष्प्रवृत्तीचा स्वैर संचार ! तात्पर्य , शिक्षणाचे मूळ उद्दीष्ट -सुसंस्कार ,चारित्र्यसंवर्धन , आदर्श नागरिक -माणूस याची निर्मिती ते पूर्णपणे विफल झाले आहे. शासनाने याबाबत प्रमुख व मूलभूत अशा १० मूल्यांची निवड करून विद्यार्थ्यांवर संस्कारित करण्याचा संकल्प जरी आयोजला केला असेल तरी याचे अनुभवात्मक शिक्षण देण्याविषयीचा विचार करणे गरजेचे आहे. मूल्यशिक्षण आपल्याला हे नक्की शिकवतं की, 'इतरांची रेष पुसण्यात आपली ऊर्जा वाया घालवण्यापेक्षा आपली रेष त्यांच्यापेक्षा मोठी करण्याचा प्रयत्न केला तर ते जास्त उत्तम!'




IT IS HIGH TIME

STOICISM Maredia Maarefa, F.Y.B.A



Stoicism is a school of philosophy which was founded in Athens by 'Zeno of Citium' but was famously practiced by the likes of Marcus Aurelius, Epictetus, and Seneca. People who follow stoicism are called 'stoics'. It was originally called 'Zenonism' but later came to be known as 'stoicism' because Zeno and his followers used to meet in 'Stoa Poikilê', or painted porch. For almost 5 centuries from the onset it was the one of the most influential philosophies. It was practiced by everyone from the rich to the poor in the pursuit of good life. Over the centuries, however, it got almost forgotten. It was only since 1970s that stoicism has grown in popularity again. Mainly because it's been the philosophical inspiration for Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) and because of authors like William Irvine and Ryan Holiday who wrote about the

philosophy.

In a nutshell the philosophy of stoicism is 'it teaches how to keep calm and rational mind no matter what happens to you and it helps you understand and focus on what you can control and not worry about and accept what you can't control.' Our thoughts and actions are truly up to us thus the most appealing aspect of stoicism is that we are responsible for our flourishing because all that truly matters in life is up to us.

So the key lesson to take away here is to focus our attention and efforts where we have the most power and then let the universe take care of the rest. The Stoics used the archer analogy to explain this:

An archer is trying to hit a target. He has a number of things under his control, such as training, which bow and arrow to use, how well to aim, and when to let go of the arrow. So he can do his very best up to the moment when the arrow leaves his bow. Now, will he hit the target?

That is not up to him. After all, a gust of wind, a sudden movement of the target, or something could go between the arrow and the target. And the Stoic archer is ready to accept all possible outcomes with equanimity, because he has done his best and left the rest (what he could not control) to nature.



On the Importance of Reading

Recent events have left us in a peculiar predicament, a situation of abundant 'free time'. We have more time than we can spend, or so it seems. But, there are only so many movies, TV shows and games one can 'consume' before one is left with that vexed question – Now what? That being the case, I propose a one word answer: **Read.**

There is no denying that reading has a great number of positive effects on the mind. Books not only impart valuable lessons from years of first-hand experiences of the author, but improve focus, concentration, memory and broaden imagination and creativity. Despite the voluminous literature supporting this, people are generally averse to reading.

But, the primary argument I put forward is that reading books humbles a person. It makes you realize what you know, and what you don't. You start questioning the world. Reading can solidify or shatter your nascent views. It helps in distinguishing between facts and feelings. The economist Thomas Sowell once said, *"The problem isn't that Johnny can't read. The problem isn't even that Johnny can't think. The problem is that Johnny doesn't know what thinking is; he confuses it with feeling."* It is precisely reading that develops critical and analytical thinking.

Another salient advantage books have over other forms of media like TV shows and movies is that they improve vocabulary, language command, and communication skills. Articulation is a deeply valued skill in an increasingly competitive world. Reading textbooks to get better grades, to get valued degrees, to get high paying jobs are all just and noble causes. But make no mistake, there is nothing more powerful than someone who is articulate, someone who can think and speak. 'Power' meaning authority, influence, respectability, and competence.

We sense the harm of deteriorating physical health immediately, in the form of loss of mobility, shortness of breath, or heart problems and diabetes in the long run; and we are usually keen to rid ourselves of these problems either ex ante or ex post. But for whatever reason we are apathetic to deteriorating mental and emotional health. What gyms and healthy eating are to physical health, books are to mental health. The iconic character of Tyrion Lannister from author George R. R. Martin's revered fantasy series 'A Song of Ice and Fire' brilliantly said, "*A mind needs books like a sword needs a whetstone.*"

With the above in mind, one can safely conclude that reading builds temperament and character, be it through empathy, humility, knowledge, vocabulary, inter alia. To quote Emerson, *"I cannot remember the books I've read any more than the meals I have eaten; even so, they have made me."* To those who rationalize spending hours on Netflix and Instagram by saying that books require deep concentration, I say; a book will not go on without you. Water War: Myth Or Fact

The territory of Kashmir is an integral part the Indian Federal System and a disputed territory for the whole world. This issue has been a major obstacle in the path of India's progress. If we try to study the geographical features of this area and its political importance we come to know about the following features:

- 1. The territory of Kashmir can be divided into three parts i.e. the Azad Kashmir or POK i.e. Pakistan Occupied Kashmir, the Jammu and Kashmir region of India and the Aksai Chin or the COK China Occupied Kashmir.
- 2. It is this territory of India which shares borders with Afghanistan, Pakistan as well as China, making it a strategically important location for India to keep a check on its enemies.

 It is Kashmir which connects India with central Asian countries like Afghanistan, Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, Turkmenistan, Tajakistan and other European countries.

So according to the above features one can imagine about Kashmir's strategic importance. There may be many thoughts in the minds of people for the reason behind Pakistan's aggression towards India for Kashmir. But to understand this, we need to have a brief knowledge about this country. Today Pakistan stands as the world's fastest economy with respect to its downfall. Today the economy of Pakistan is so much worst that it is completely dependent on the loans and donations by International Organizations and other countries (honorary mention: China). If we talk about the political structure of this country, there are four administrative divisions of Pakistan namely Punjab, Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa, Sindh and Balochistan and two federal territories namely Islamabad Capital Territory and Gilgit-Baltistan. But except Sindh and Punjab provinces the other two territories are neglected. All major developmental projects consider only the above two territories. And now Pakistan is favouring in making Azad Kashmir its fifth province. So now let us see what are the possible reasons for which Pakistan is after Kashmir.

The Indus River System

If you look at the above map a clear cut representation of the Indus River can be seen. Sutlej, Beas, Ravi, Jhelum, Chenab are the major tributaries of river Indus. Now as the area which is encircled represents the flow of these tributaries into the main river. These are the rivers which actually provide water to river Indus, throughout the year. Secondly if we see the geographical locations of these rivers then you may clearly visualize and relate these two factors! River Indus is considered as the lifeline of Pakistan. And it is at this point only where our friendly neighbor becomes sensitive. After the partition itself the feeling of insecurity towards this region started struggling in the minds of the then leaders of Pakistan. They wanted full control over the water system of River Indus, and as a result this conflict. India being a secular and a peace loving country as it is, decided to resolve this matter peacefully. And so on 19th of September 1960 we got the Indus Water Treaty which was held at Karachi and was signed by Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru the then Prime Minister of India and General Ayub Khan the then Dictatorial President of Pakistan. But this agreement was proved to be a total failure. .

Now let us come to the very title of our article. Friends, the term Water war may seem a mystery to a lay man but it is as real and vicious that no one would ever imagineAccording to some experts, the use of, or in more detailed terms, tampering with the water bodies which can cause damage to a particular geographical area and life over it is called waging of water war. The source or medium of the war is mostly the rivers flowing through the countries. The term used by the experts for this is called '**Water Bomb**.' Experts analyze that India could wage a water war on Pakistan in two possible ways:

- 1. By diverting the flow of the five tributaries of river Indus towards the Punjab or Kashmir region and as a result creating a water scarcity in Pakistan.
- 2. By opening of the dams on the five tributaries of river Indus resulting in large scale floods in Pakistan.

Though India denies the use of Water bomb on Pakistan, but a threat still looms on Pakistan. So, in this way the Kashmir dispute is not a religious or a socio-political issue but a geo-political issue.



(below) Vedanta Aluminum refinery Orissa The Niyamgiri hill range in Odisha state, eastern India, is home to the Dongria Kondh tribe. Niyamgiri is an area of densely forested hills, deep gorges and cascading streams. To be a Dongria Kondh is to farm the hills' fertile slopes, harvest their produce, and worship the mountain god Niyam Raja and the hills he presides over, including the Mountain of the Law, Niyam Dongar.

The tribe vowed to save their Niyamgiri Hills and their self-sufficient way of life. They inspired millions when they won a 'David and Goliath' battle against mining giant Vedanta Resources.

THE MINING THREAT!



Vedanta Resources is a London-listed, former FTSE 100 mining company founded by Indian billionaire Anil Agarwal, who remains its Chairman and owns more than 50% of the shares. Had the mine gone ahead, the Dongria would have suffered immeasurable loss; their present good health, self-sufficiency, identity as a people and detailed knowledge of their environment would have been destroyed. A large proportion of the benefits would have gone to one man: Anil Agarwal.

The company planned to create an open-cast mine that would have violated Niyam Dongar, disrupted its rivers and spelt the end of the Dongria Kondh as a distinct people. The bauxitecapped Niyamgiri hills soak up the monsoon's rain, giving rise to more than a hundred perennial streams and rivers, including the Vamshadhara river.

These streams provide the water that is vital for the communities who live in the hills, and provide critical drinking and irrigation water for those in the plains, where drought and starvation have made national

news. The Vamshadhara provides drinking and irrigation water to millions of people in the states of Odisha and Andhra Pradesh. Over centuries, the Dongria have helped to maintain the rich biodiversity of their forests, where tigers, leopards, giant squirrels and sloth bears roam

THE ILLEGAL REFINERY!

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Even before receiving permission to mine, Vedanta built a refinery in the town of Lanjigarh, and started to work on the conveyor belt that would bring the bauxite straight down from the hills to the refinery. The refinery was approved by 'ground water contamination' caused by the government on the condition that no forest would be used; yet the claim was 'patently false' - the red mud. The toxic waste has also Vedanta annexed 60 hectares of village forest, vital for local communities. The refinery also completely destroyed Kinari village, displacing over a hundred Majhi Kondh families to a settlement known locally as 'the rehab colony'. This is a walled compound of concrete houses, circled with barbed wire. Residents have no farmland, and although some work as labourers for Vedanta, most survive on handouts. Kondh villagers blame pollution from the refinery for skin problems, livestock diseases and crop

damage. 'Red mud', a toxic slurry that is the refinery's main waste product, dries to a fine dust in the sun. Government pollution inspectors have described 'alarming' and 'continuous' seepage of leaked into the Vamsadhara River.

ENVIRONMENTAL DAMAGE!

Vedanta's own plan states that mining would continue for 16 hours a day, 6 days a week for 23 years. 'Oily' sludge from machinery would be incinerated on site. The influx of mine workers – with heavy

machinery and trucks – would place an enormous burden on the forests and wildlife, which would be exploited for firewood and food. The area would also become accessible to poachers and illegal loggers. Although Vedanta claims that they will plant trees once mining has finished, this is no compensation for the diverse wildlife habitat that will be lost, nor for the potential damage to the streams and rivers that flow from the hills. As the Kalahandi area is notorious for its droughts, the effects could be disastrous.

RESISTANCE!

The Dongria protested against Vedanta locally, nationally and internationally. They held roadblocks, formed a human chain around the Mountain of Law and even set a Vedanta jeep alight when it was driven onto the mountain's sacred plateau. But as long as the refinery sits at the foot of their hills, they do not feel their mountain is safe and will not give up their fight.

As a result of this movement the kondh resistance movement got international support which ultimately led to the falling of the Vedanta refinery. Although they won the battle, their struggle to protect their 'Mountain God' still continues.....

The Jungle Book – A Date with the Leopard @ Nagzira Tiger Reserve

Presentations, college activities and research work had become my life. Spending 2-3 hours on the laptop and another 2 on the phone was considered the "normal routine" internet usage time for my generation. This was exactly how I'd be spending my winter holidays had not our Nature Club teacher in-charge Prof. Radhika D'Souza asked me to join the 4 night, 5 days trip to Nagzira Tiger Reserve in Nagpur. The trip was scheduled from the 28th of December to the 1st of January 2019. What a way to end 2018 and bring in the last year of the decade!



This was to be my first long distance train journey and I barely knew anyone from the 40 odd students in the group. But you know what? By the time we finished our 16-hour train journey, that fact didn't bother me anymore. We reached Nagpur station by 6 am. From there on we all piled into 6 eight-seater cars for our journey to the Nagzira Tiger Reserve which was around 2 hours away from the station. Our first halt was outside the Pithezari Gate which is the starting point of the Reserve. A short camp briefing by Mr. Nikit Surve (Ex-Royalite and our amazing, fun-loving and knowledgeable guide) was followed by lunch post which all of us went and sat in our respective open-air jeeps.

Safaris were twice a day: Morning 6:30am to 10:00am & Afternoon 2pm to 5:30pm

We would come back to the camp (which by the way, was bang in the middle of the forest- the core area- at a distance of 11kms from the gate, surrounded by langurs from all sides) only to freshen up, have lunch/dinner, discussions and a few games.Note: 6:30am safaris used to be the coldest. Temperatures were freezing cold with Nagpur experiencing its coldest winter in 50 years at 3.5 degrees Celsius.

Each safari for us was different. The reason being that every time we went out, we took a different path, a different trail and ended up sighting an entirely different set of animals and birds. Our guides and team leaders were fantastic. They had so much knowledge on every single thing that we saw, that I was awestruck. Their passion for nature was very apparent. So much so that by the end of our trip, even I was pointing out to birds and rattling off their characteristics with confidence!

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The 3 best sightings for me were: 1) The Indian Goar 2) The leopard

The Indian Goar was MASSIVE. The definition of masculinity. Big, black guy with ankle high white socks. Somehow, I had this feeling that if he, even for a second, got irritated and decided that we were an annoying piece of metal obstructing his path, he wouldn't think twice before over turning our jeep. And I wasn't wrong about that. My guide later on told me that he did have the strength to do so. Even leopards and tigers don't hunt him. Some personality right there! 30th December 2018 is a day I'm never going to forget for the rest of my life. I've been on countless safaris. But never have I ever, ever had a leopard sighting from so close behind me.




Goosebumps!!!.Just few feet away from our open jeep...& walks away majestically

12 Feet. We saw a leopard cross the road just 12 feet away from our jeep and less than a kilometer away from where our living quarters were. Call that dangerous or thrilling, but it was one of the best experiences of my life; and needless to say for all the other people involved in the sighting. Truly the highlight of our trip.

The leopard was handsome, smaller than I expected, but we all knew the difference between him and us. The minute we all spotted him, there was pin drop silence in the jungle. Except for the warning calls, there wasn't any other sound. It was as if everyone was giving him "his space". For a minute it looked as if the road was a runway, and he, the show stopper.

The surprising part was that the leopard himself didn't frighten me. The fact that he was only 500 meters away from our dorms was what unhinged me. The previous night, the guides told us that leopards had been spotted. That morning's leopard sighting ensured that none of us stepped out of our rooms that evening after dark. Also, dark over there meant pitch black. So you had to walk with someone and hold onto a really strong beam of light if you didn't want to bump into a langur or worst case leopard in the middle of the evening.



DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY

ARTS

Department of Psychology organizes extracurricular and cocurricular activities to facilitate holistic development of the learners. It also focuses on destigmatizing mental illness and creating awareness about it. On 7th September 2018, the department of Psychology organized "Mind Amaze"- a series of psychological games as a part of Gyan Manthan, an annual academic festival these games were designed using the principles of cognitive psychology. The event was perceived as non-threatening and interesting by all participants. These games helped students learn to use creativity in presenting psychological concepts. It also facilitated mental health support and promotion in college. A skit was presented by our students on World Mental Health Day, 10th October 2018, on the theme 'Young People and Mental Health in a Changing World'. Guest lectures are organized to gain a wider understanding of application of psychology. Ms. Ann Rary Charles was the resource person of 'Psych Doodle' and 'Psych Script', she helped students discover the use of creative writing and art in mental health promotion. Ms. Sara Ibrahim highlighted about speech concerns among children with special needs and shared the etiquettes of communication when interacting with special needs individual during a session on 'Speech Therapy for Children with Special Needs'. Dr. Yusuf Matcheswalla and Dr. Ali Gabrani emphasized about significance of dreams, aspirations and goals among adolescents during their interaction with the students on the theme "Youth Rudderless?" Dr. Aruna Sadarangani was the guest speaker for the talk "Unfolding the Journey from Womb to Cradle" she educated the students about the stages of pregnancy, labour process and care needed during pregnancy. To facilitate informed career choices/decisions the department conducted career guidance session on 'Special Education' by Ms. Nishat Imam - Special Educator. Our alumni, Ms. Abdul Qayyum Uzma Mohammed, MS. Urusah Sheikh and Kulsum Sayed shared their experience of application and admission process to higher education in premier institutes. Educational visits aim at helping students witness psychology being applied in real world. Trip to Café Arpan - Juhu helped the students of SYBA and TYBA to appreciate and respect people with disability. At "NeuroGen: Brain & Spine Research Institute" - Vashi, students of FYBA, SYBA and TYBA explored the application of psychology in the diagnosis, treatment and remediation of neurogenetic and neurodevelopmental disorders. Shraddha Rehabilitation Centre [Karjat] - centre for the destitute with mental illness, Urja Foundation [Dadar] - home for destitute women and Happy Feet Home [Sion] - hospice day care centre for children with HIV+ and thalassemia were the non-governmental organizational visited by the students. Students of SYBA and TYBA conducted a session on the importance of hygiene and education for the younger boys. For the adolescent boys, the students organized a session on the importance of career planning on importance of learning and having career goal for boys at Nirikishan Balgrah - home for boys in Karjat. Screening of educational movies [Wonder, Letters to God, Gifted Hands, Bevond the Blackboard, Ron Clark, Emperors Club] provided an opportunity to discuss and deliberate on issues related to mental health and wellbeing. Certificate course on Palliative Care: A Psychological Approach was conducted in collaboration with Palliative Care department of Bhaktivedanta hospital. Students undertake internship during summer vacation or any time during the academic year. It provides an opportunity to hone professional skills and etiquettes, thereby enhance the employability. It also helps them understand the work culture, professional ethics and discover their forte thereby

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIOLOGY

ARTS

The Department curriculum emphasis is on teaching and learning of general concerns in sociology as well as the issues of sociological significance such as tribal rights, social exclusion and gender. The department uses combination of experiential, participative and creative pedagogy for transacting the curricula with the aim of fostering dialogue, mutual learning and critical reflection. The pedagogical practices also utilise an inter-disciplinary approach such as training in disaster management and urban farming. The students not only learn critical approaches and perspectives in the classroom but also are motivated to participate in field visits such as Industrial Visit, visit to tribal area etc. The department also exposes the students to the existing social realities through outreach programmes- regular visit to old age home, screening of films and documentaries on social issues and expert lectures on 'Women and Health', 'Prevention of Crime Against Women', 'Careers in Governmer' Sector'.

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DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

During the academic year 2018-19 Department of Commerce organized various activities that aimed at the holistic development of the students through its club known as **Commerce Association**. The Association works with an objective of motivating students to participate in events, thereby enhancing their critical thinking and ability to acknowledge creative ideas. In the year 2018-19 events such as SWOT Analysis, Fight the Plight, LOGO making, Management Games, Brand Mania, On The Spot AD making, were organized. A research review paper was also organized for the TYBSc students where they were first trained to read a research paper and then were asked to present a review on the selected paper. Expert guest lectures on topics like Spectroscopy, Calibration of Glassware were also organized. The Chemical Association published in-house newsletter Chem Zone which had articles contributed by students on Scientist Profile, Environment Watch and New Frontiers in Chemistry.

DEPARTMENT OF COMPUTER SCIENCE

Guest lectures were conducted by our alumni Mr. Rehban Adam Khatri and Mr. Ajit Balachandran on 'Robotic Process Automation' and 'Career guidance to bridge gap between academics and industry' respectively. A guest lecture was organized on 'Data Science' by Mr. Sanjeev Gupta (Team Leader of SDAC Infotech) for TYBSC, SYBSC Computer Science and Physics students. SCIENCE

With the objective of developing mathematical curiosity, abstract, logical and critical thinking, the Mathematics department organized various co-curricular as well as extra-curricular activities during the year. Co-curricular learning activities like Aptitude Tests, Crossword Puzzles, Maths Sudoku, Mathematical Game Stalls, Maths Souvenir, Calci Masters, Mathalaton (Maths Relay) were organized to make learning mathematics an enjoyable experience. To help the students crack the quantitative section of various competitive exam, the department conducted a certificate course on 'Quantitative Aptitude' for the SYBSc students. Catering to student diversity the department organized Bridge course, Remedial lectures and Tutorial Tests to decrease the study workload of the students by means of continuous evaluation of the slow learners. The advanced learners were guided to present their research projects for which the book bank of the department was made available for providing them with additional learning resources. To sensitize the students towards social issues the department conducted group discussion and debates on socially relevant topics. Activities like Annual Maths Seminar (intracollegiate) and MATHSHOW (intercollegiate) competition and E-Treasure Hunt were organized to help the students develop their soft skills.



DEPARTMENT OF MICROBIOLOGY

The Department of Microbiology conducts various cocurricular & extracurricular activities under the flagship of 'Association of Royal Microbiologist' (ARaMB) in order to facilitate overall development of the students. Various brainstorming and de-stressing activities like MicroRangoli, MicroParady, Treasure Hunt, MicroQuiz, MicroCrossword & Industrial Visits were conducted to motivate and inculcate liking for the subject. It helps students to understand difficult concepts as the subject is tossed playfully during the activities. Activities like MicroTaboo, MicroMeme & Anguthachaap! helps showcase creative skills of the students. Most of the activities are planned and organized by students, helping them hone their leadership skills. Students are encouraged to take up research projects at inter and intra collegiate levels. Participation in MicroOlympiad & other intercollegiate competitions help students assess & evaluate their understanding of the subject. The annual freshers and alumni meet is clubbed with the Prize Distribution Ceremony to facilitate an interaction with one another, and provide an insight into the subject.

DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICS

SCIENCE

The objective of the activities conducted by the Royal Physics Club was to increase the interest of physics among the students. To keep the students abreast of the latest technology, a workshop on robotics was organized for the students of FYBSc, SYBSc and TYBSc Physics. During Gyan Manthan, students applied the laws of physics to design fun games like Shock Loop, Memory Power, Snake and Ladder, Torque. To create awareness about environment, a poster making competition on 'Save Electricity' was organized. A physics quiz was organized to test the knowledge and understanding of the students about various concepts. An intercollegiate competition of physics projects and seminar on the topic 'Alternate source of energy' was conducted under the auspice of Gyan Manthan. Students from nine different colleges participated in the competition. To increase the interest of the students in astronomy and astrophysics, an overnight sky gaze and a talk on 'Geomagnetism and Space Weather' were organized. To impart scientific knowledge to the underprivileged students of the Municipal school, certain scientific experiments were demonstrated by FYBSc and SYBSc students. Two issues of the newsletter "New Horizon" were published during the academic year.

DEPARTMENT OF ZOOLOGY

SCIENCE

Activities were conducted such that students get practical knowledge and help them gain a broad outlook. Several excursions and visits were conducted. Students of SYBSc visited the 'Amul' factory at Virar, Shivani Scientific - IVF Lab and Nisarg Organic, Virar to learn about vermiculture. They also visited Gorai sea shore to study marine biodiversity. Students of FYBSc visited Bhuigaon sea shore to study sea shores and diversity. These visits and excursions help them to understand habitats, biodiversity and perhaps identify and crystallize their future plans. 'Nutrition Day' was observed to emphasize the ill effects of fast food and modern lifestyle. During Gyan Manthan, PPT on "Animal Wonders" and games pertaining to animals were organized by students. The movie Gifted Hands was screened. FYBSc students took part in a debate, the objective of which was to critique and analyse ethical issues that arise due to applications of Biotechnology. Talk on Genetic Counselling was conducted by Mr Sachin Chaurasiya, an alumnus. Mr. Jayesh Vishwakarma, Education Officer from NIC, SGNP spoke on 'Biodiversity Along Mumbai Coastline'. The E-waste project continued with Eco-Reco as the collaborating partner. About 471 Kg. of E-waste has been collected. Students of SYBSc and FYBSc took part in the Research presentation.

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Workshop on Remodelled Structure of Evaluation for Class XII (English, Hindi & Marathi) - A Report

The Maharashtra State Board of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education conducted a two-day workshop on 26th and 27th July 2018 in the languages of English, Hindi & Marathi at Royal College of Arts, Science and Commerce. The topic for the workshop was-"Remodelled Structure of Evaluation." A full-day workshop on Marathi and Hindi was held on 26th July, 2018. The resource persons for Marathi were Prof. Manisha R. Raorane of Royal College of Arts, Science & Commerce and Prof. Vipula Patil of Abhinav Junior College of Arts, Science & Commerce. The resource person for Hindi was Prof. Pradnya Dalvi of Royal College of Arts Science and Commerce. There were 32 teachers from colleges across Mira-Bhayandar and Borivali in attendance at the session in Hindi.17 teachers attended the workshop in Marathi. The workshop in English was organised on 27th July with a total of 71 teachers in attendance. The resource persons for English were Prof. Shivaji Kalvale from Shankar Narayan College of Arts and Commerce and Prof. Anjali Purandare from Abhinav College of Arts, Science and Commerce. The workshop focussed on the recent changes in the evaluation structure, objectives behind the change, challenges faced in its implementation and question paper pattern. The workshop was carried forward by speakers who discussed the remodelled paper pattern for class XII. The teachers were also acquainted with various parts of the textbook and its assessment and preparation of a balanced question paper. Handouts containing sample activities on all the lessons in the textbook and blue print of the question paper were distributed among all the participants. The trainers successfully transformed the workshop into an interactive one. Many doubts in relation to real classroom situations were clarified during the course of the session. Discussions on how teachers could implement new methods of teaching to enhance academic standards of students were also held. The session was made even more interesting with activities to convey clarity on various aspects.




CERTIFICATE COURSES BASIC ACCOUNTANCY

Palliative Care – A Psychological Approach, of 15 hours was organized for the F.Y.B.A and S.Y.B.A students. Mr. Prashob K. [Counsellor] conducted interactive and role-play sessions for students that focused on various psychotherapeutic techniques and complementary therapies. The course was conducted from August 2018 to March 2019. 12 students successfully completed the course.

Outcomes:


- The students learnt to describe palliative care and identify the various sub-fields.


